HE MAY have been a journeyman whose goals to clubs ratio made a mockery of his position as a striker before he joined Amakhosi but with this brace vesterday. Venezuelan Gustavo Paez went a long way to silencing his detractors

With vet another embarrassing defeat to a lower division outfit looming large for Chiefs in the Nedbank Cup, Paez came off the bench save the day. Two goals in seven minutes

looked as though the third-tier outfit would pull off a remarkable victory that would set them up nicely for the upcoming play-offs for promotion into the National First Division (NFD).

Having managed to take the lead just before half-time, despite being reduced to 10 men when Sandy Nyathi was sent off for a dangerous tackle on Erick Mathoho, Acornbush held their own against Chiefs

Steve Komphela, aware he had to go for broke, sacrificed fullbacks Sibusiso Khumalo and Kgotso Moleko for attackers Paez and Thwala and the result were immediately evident. Their attacking approach was a far cry from their earlier display during which they allowed their hosts to get into their danger zone t hrough long punts from the back.

When referee Chris Harrison sent off Nyathi, it appeared the ABC Motsepe League outfit were in trouble. Instead it was they who scored courtesy of their long-ball approach. A ball sent long to the left found Mduduzi Nkosi and he delivered an immediate cross that at first seemed inno<mark>cuous only for</mark> Rhulani Sidumo to rush in from the right and headed it powerfully

past Khune at the near post. But then midway through the first half, Chiefs pressed the homeside into their own half and while they seemed to be doing

well to keep Amakhosi a bay, it was only a matter of time before they cracked. It was largely thanks to Ma-suku that Acornbush held on for as long as they did – the Man of the Match denying Chiefs on numerous occasions with some

splendid saves. But there was very little he could do to stop Paez from en-dearing himself to the Amakhosi faithful, who must now no longer remember that he came to their club on the back of an unimpressive scoring record with numerous clubs
