ST: Yeah, he came to train with us for a couple of days, but it wasn't going to be possible to bring him in, although he is a decent player. We are looking and I have some staff that are always looking at a few players. But, as you say, there are some positives that came out of the team and it's better than not creating anything. We have that movement and have options in and around the box. We are looking at guys that have the confidence to finish, but things are terrible. There is potential and we just need to polish.

KS: The big story of this transfer window will be Sinethenba Jantjie's next move, with all of the Big Three said to be interested in his services.

ST: Yeah, I'd love to keep him at the club. At the end of the day, business is business. Sometimes coaches just can't... it's a business thing and the business side is up to management.
