Every game I play for UP-Tuks is to honour his memory. My dad instilled the love for football in me. I remember when I was still young how he would wake us up to watch Orlando Pirates play. He was a big fan," Siluma explained.

Not playing football was never an option for Siluma. Chasing a ball and trying to outfox rivals with fleet-footed skills

is just a continuance of a proud family tradition started by his grandfather. Growing up in

Piet Retief meant that Siluma had to work his way through the ranks before he got to play for UP-Tuks.
