Tuks rower completes her collection of world medals

Rowing is also a huge mental challenge, especially when competing at the highest level.

Kirsten McCann completed her collection of rowing World Cup medals over the weekend when she won a gold

medal in Lucerne, Switzerland. The Tuks/HPC-rower was in awesome form, rowing away from her rivals with brute strength

She increased her lead with each stroke to win the lightweight women's singles sculls winning in 7:45.75. Marieke Keijser (Netherlands)

finished nearly three seconds later clocking a time of 7:48.61 with Patricia Merz (Switzerland) third in 7:50.00.

Last year partnering Ursula Grobler in the lightweight women's double sculls, McCann won silver and bronze medals in the World Cup Series

McCann is on record saying that good technique as well as being physically strong and fit is of utmost importance to be competitive in international rowing. "Rowing is also a huge mental

challenge especially when competing at the highest level. To put your body on the line is a huge ask. It is a challenge I relish," she said.

South Africa's men's fours (David Hunt, Lawrence Brittain, John Smith, Jake Green) came close to winning the bronze medal.

The British crew won in 5:52.92. with Italy second in 5:54.42 and the Netherlands third in 5:54.72 The South African crew was a mere 0.05s behind the Dutch crew

"I think we learnt a lot and that is the first goal of coming to the world cup. Coming so close to a top three finish is frustrating, but it gives us confidence and the desire to have a quality block of training before the World

Championships in Sarasota," said Hunt, Smith said their build-up to the World Cup was far from ideal as they battled with sickness which meant they could not prepare as they had wanted.


"Our performance in the heat was not the best, but we manage to up our game in the semi-final," said Smith.

"In the final, we did not execute as we wanted but towards the second half of the race we started to find our rhythm which enabled us to get stronger towards the end."

Brittain, who won a silver medal at last year's Olympic Games in Rio, described their performance as bittersweet.

'The final was tough. Just missing out on winning a medal really 'sucks' but was not all bad. We proved that we are in the mix," he said.

"With two months of good solid hard training who knows what might happen at the World Championships
