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MESSAGE FROM THE ACTING DIRECTOR

Driven by our vision "To be a leading local and international teaching and research centre in the fields of augmentative and alternative communication, severe disabilities and early childhood intervention" we expanded our activities with the support of many different individuals, departments and organizations.

Our strategic goal to facilitate positive change in the lives of individuals, families and their support systems as defined in our mission (2009-2012) led our efforts through:

- capacity building
- sustainable evidence-based practice
- relevant research
- collaboration and networking
- consulting and impacting on policy development and implementation

This Annual Report 2009 reflects some of the work we engaged in, in order to reach these goals. Some highlights include the following:

- Increased collaboration with the National Department of Education, which impacted most significantly in capacity building in South African classrooms. This is seen by the enrolment of 125 teachers into our Advanced Certificate in Education specializing in Inclusion of Learners with Severe Disabilities (Gauteng Department of Education), the enrolment of 28 teachers into the Honours degree (sponsored by the Eastern Cape Department of Education) as well as the Assistive Technology Tender for Limpopo, funded by the National Department of Education.
- Consultation with the South African Revenue Service (SARS) on the amendment to Section 18 of the Income Tax Act, which resulted in the development of new guidelines for this act.
- Many research projects were undertaken by staff and students, resulting in three completed PhD's, four ISI accredited journal publications, a book, as well as three book chapters.

These achievements were reached despite the fact that 2009 held many organizational challenges, e.g. the centre was re-allocated from the Faculty of Education to the Faculty of Humanities, and a new Director is yet to be appointed (I functioned as the Acting Director from January to December 2009).

It is with a feeling of pride and gratitude that I present this Annual report. Pride, because of the way in which the centre staff pulled together to cope with the tremendous growth in student numbers despite a decrease in staff and the fact that a new Director was not appointed in 2009.

Gratitude due to the confidence of our Advisory Board, alumni, current students, local and international partners, colleagues and peers in the field and their valued input and effort in collaboration. The support of these individuals enabled the Centre for AAC to once again contribute to improve the quality of life of one of the most vulnerable groups in our society, namely those with severe disabilities.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW: 2009 IN A NUTSHELL

1. Teaching

Objectives for 2009

- To graduate 2 PhD students and 19 Master's students.
- To secure bursaries for at least 2 new Master's level students.
- To enrol 15 new M(ECI) and 6 new M(AAC) students.
- To enrol 20 new BA (Hons).

Outcomes for 2009

- 3 PhD and 23 Masters (17 in ECI and 6 in AAC) students completed their studies.
- A total of 10 Masters students received bursaries.
- A total of 18 students registered for the M(ECI) and 6 for the M(AAC). Two students, one in each programme, terminated their studies due to health reasons.
- The enrolment exceeded expectations as a total number of 48 BA (Hons) students enrolled of which 28 were subsidised by the Eastern Cape Department of Education.
- 125 students enrolled for the ACE (Inclusion of Learners with Severe Disabilities), a programme sponsored by the Gauteng Department of Education.

2. Research

Objectives for 2009

- To expand the annual AAC Research Seminar by including a day on ECI Research.
- To conduct a study aimed at exploring the needs of families with children with disabilities in low income contexts.

Outcomes for 2009

- The two day Research Seminar was most productive and created interesting discussion and fruitful debate.
- Two staff research projects were undertaken, and the needs-based study on children in low income contexts was postponed to 2010.
 - Project 1: Reducing the Risk of being a victim of crime in SA: "You can tell and be heard" was undertaken with Dr Diane Bryen (Temple University, USA). This project will continue in 2010.
 - Project 2: "Teachers' perceptions of inclusion of two types of learners: One with little or no functional speech (LNFS) and one with attention deficit and hyperactivity disorder (ADHD)" was conducted in Kimberley. This project was completed and is currently being written-up for publication in the Perspectives in Education (PIE) journal.

3. Community Engagement

Objectives for 2009

- To conduct 2 tender training projects in schools and communities during the first part of the year.
- To train teachers in "inclusive education" as part of the Government's initiative to enhance teacher qualifications by means of in-service teacher training programmes.
- To increase community training activities in Mamelodi in compliance with the new vision of the University of Pretoria's service learning activities.

Outcomes for 2009

- One tender training project in Limpopo (at Letaba Special School) was successfully completed, whilst one in KwaZulu-Natal (Hlu-hluwe) was cancelled due to financial constraints by the Department of Education in KwaZulu-Natal.
- An Inclusive Play Park is being developed for the Mamelodi Campus.
- FOFA (Youth Leadership Empowerment project) was presented for the 5th time.
- Please see "Teaching" for a discussion of the ACE students.

4. Operational Component

Objectives for 2009

Follow-through of recommendations made by the external review of the CAAC, namely:

- To ensure continuity throughout the organizational and structural changes caused by the appointment of a new director and the change from the Faculty of Education to the Faculty of Humanities.
- To explore ways of solving staff issues in terms of diverse activities and demands placed on staff.
- To address the lack of office and lab space.
- To continue working with the Department of Education Innovation to ensure problem solving of webrelated problems as the CAAC is highly dependent on the web as most of the programmes are run via Click-UP.
- To extend the project on training teachers in the North West province (funded by the First Rand Foundation).
- To collaborate with industry (IT Web Technology) to support the FOFA leadership programme.


Outcomes for 2009

- A new Director has not been appointed. Prof Juan Bornman acted in this position from January to December. The change from the Faculty of Education to Humanities had implications on many levels, resulting in substantial re-organization in the CAAC. The Dean of the Faculty of Humanities has expressed a need to link the line management functions of the CAAC to the Department of Communication Pathology. Both entities will, however, retain financial independence and independent staff components.
- A new staff member (teacher) was appointed due to the large intake of the ACE students. This post is funded from the funds received from the Gauteng Department of Education.
- Additional cupboards have been purchased to assist with storage, resulting in more economic use of space.
- Collaboration with the Department of Education Innovation is ongoing. It is expected that Click-UP
 access will improve in 2010 once the University gets more bandwidth with a faster broadband
 system in place.
- No funding was received in 2009 from the First Rand Foundation as the guidelines and submission dates have changed. Will re-apply in 2010.
- No funding was received from IT Web Technology as the participating sponsors withdrew due to the global recession.
- SIDA funding was obtained for a 3-year collaborative project entitled "ICF-CY: A common language for understanding the multidimensional construct disability in childhood" with Prof Mats Granlund, Jöngköping University, Sweden.

3. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

3.1 Tender Training Projects

3.1.1 National Department of Education: Northern Province, Letaba School in Tzaneen



Topic: Assessment and training on Augmentative and Alternative Communication Assistive Devices for learners in Letaba School for special needs learners.

The aim of this project was to provide 20 learners who had been identified by the teachers in the school as possible candidates for communication devices, with assistive communication devices.

27-30 January: This initial week was used to conduct an assessment of 20 learners to determine the appropriate assistive communication devices that should be ordered.

9-13 March: After the initial assessment phase, the appropriate devices were ordered and during this second visit the focus was on the implementation of the devices with the specific identified children and training of the teachers involved in how to accommodate the AAC users in the classroom.

3.2 Community Engagement Projects

3.2.1 Community of Practice for the Development of an Inclusive Play Park at UP's Mamelodi Campus



The development of an Inclusive Play Park on the Mamelodi Campus of the University of Pretoria continues to gain increasing support from community. On the 7th May 2009 a landmark meeting took place where important role players in the community, who are involved in Early Childhood Development and Disability, were invited to attend a presentation on the proposed play park with members of the CAAC as well as management of the Mamelodi Campus. The project gained the support of the meeting attendees who were very excited about the proposed venture. The result of this meeting was the formation of a joint committee, consisting of community members and UP staff to drive the project forward. Funding for the play park is also progressing with important corporate companies already confirming their financial backing for the project.

3.2.2 Youth Leadership Empowerment Project (FOFA)



This year marked the fifth anniversary of the FOFA Youth Leadership Empowerment project - a year in which the two graduates, Dan Ncgobo and Lebogang Sehako, acted as lecturers in the programme. To celebrate 5-years of FOFA a special commemorative calendar for 2010 was developed. Important media exposure was gained when the team from DTV visited the Centre during the final day presentations and interviewed some of the FOFA participants. The FOFA project and the interviews will be screened on SABC 3 on the 21 February 2010. An inspiring message of support was also received from the music artist, Mathys Roets and each FOFA participant received a copy of Mathys' latest CD. In addition the CAAC invested in the development of a corporate video which will act as a marketing strategy in order to secure much needed funding for the project.
