





Problem Statement


- SDGS awareness among the general public is still low (GhanaWeb, 2019).
- In spite of efforts made through the MDGs to promote education, 617 million youth worldwide lack basic mathematics and literacy skills (UN, 2019).
- Lack of quality education in Ghana (UN, 2019, Donkor, 2017).
- In Ghana, the proportion of the youth between ages 15-24 attending school has declined from 77.1% in 2010 to 50.3% in 2015.

Literature Review


- Atta-Obeng (2016); Amusan, Oyetola, and Ogunmodede (2012); Wijetunge (2000); Haggstrom (2004); Igbinovia (2016); IFLA (2016); Eve, de Groot, & Schmidt (2007); Leonard & Frankel (2011) ascertained the contributions of academic libraries in promoting quality education and lifelong learning.
- The quest for libraries to promote lifelong learning calls for the promotion of generic skills such as effective communication and interpersonal skills, critical thinking, problem solving, presentation skills, and ability to work in a team (Nonthacumjane, 2011, p. 283).
- <u>Research Gap</u> SDGs is still an emerging theme, hence few literature on *libraries' contribution to SDGs 4 in Ghana* are available.
- The role of library governing bodies in achieving SDG 4 have not been assessed.

Methodology

- The study is a survey of the MUCG Library and GLA.
- Both qualitative and quantitative data were collected using interviews and questionnaires.
- 100 students were randomly sampled out of a population of 2,725 to fill questionnaires in order to ascertain their awareness of SDGs, and promotion of quality education and lifelong learning.
- 83 (83%) questionnaires were returned representing 3% of the total population.
- The heads of the 2 entities were interviewed to ascertain contribution toward equitable quality education, and lifelong learning.
- GLA was selected as a subject of this study because, GLA is the governing body of all categories of libraries in Ghana. Its contribution to SDGs therefore represents a bigger SDGs story among libraries in Ghana.
- SPSS and excel have been used to organise, analyse and present the data.
- Data was analysed using the descriptive method (frequencies) of data analysis and the findings have been illustrated with graphics and tables.



















Quality Education towards Sustainable Development : The Role of Academic Libraries in Ghana

Initiatives to promote SDG 4 : Quality Education for all



- Ghana has implemented Free Compulsory Universal Basic Education (FCUBE) that allows children to freely access Basic Education up to the JHS level. (*Goal4, Target 4.2*)
- In September 2017, the government extended the free education policy to the pre-tertiary level, covering SHS, vocational and technical training at secondary level. (*Goal 4*,

Target 4.1)

Initiatives to promote SDG 4 : Quality Education for all (Count.)



- 24th October, 2018, First Lady, Mrs. Rebecca Akuffo launched *Learning to Read, Reading to Learn* initiative aimed at encouraging the habit of reading and learning among Ghanaian children. Her foundation has started building libraries in school clusters across Ghana
- October 2018, the first Lady through her foundation renovated and fully equipped the Braille production Centre in Accra. The purpose it to improve education for persons with visual ,reading

and writing impairment.



Initiatives to promote SDG 4 : Quality Education for all (Count.)



- Nana Aba Anamoah, one of Ghana's broadcasters, in the month of April, 2017 Launched an initiative, *Raising Readers Ghana*.
- \checkmark to inspire reading habits among Children both in the rural and urban areas.
- ✓ to revive the culture of reading among kids between ages 6 and 13, "*a child who reads becomes an adult who thinks*"
- Street Library Ghana, since 2011 till date aims to promote literacy and educational issues among children and the youth, especially in vulnerable communities

across the country.

- Ghana Library Authority (GLA), marked 2019 as the *Year of Reading, Reading for Progress.*
