September is a season of growth, and the UP Museums are blooming with purpose, excitement and productivity. Spring brings a time of renewal, and we're embracing the season with vibrant updates and exciting progress. As nature blossoms, so does our art collection, as we are thrilled to share a few recent acquisitions, an exciting student exhibition that draws our collections from museum storage, and some digital milestones that continue to reflect our commitment to technological growth, creativity, and collaboration.

We're excited to announce our new artworks by Sidney Kumalo, Mary Sibande, and Masonwabe Ntloko. Did you know that some of Kumalo's famous bronze sculptures were cast at South Africa's oldest bronze foundry, Renzo Vignali Foundry, right here in Pretoria? It's a joy to bring these works onto public display in our new acquisition gallery for all to appreciate and admire.

The popular **Bokgabo ba Mashela:** Art of Textiles exhibition is drawing to a close on 17 October 2025. This is after a jam-packed season filled with engaging events ranging from a **Women's Day seminar** in partnership with UP Archives and the Department of Historical & Heritage Studies, and our guest speaker, Siphokazi Tau from the University of Johannesburg. An artist's talk was held early in September by the Black Rock Residency recipient, art practitioner and researcher Wezile Harmans, and his screening of Lan Moon may la dunde. The final aspect of curatorial programming for our exhibition was the brilliant and thought-provoking Unwrapped performance directed by Dr Stephanie Jenkins that explores museum theatre through exhibition storytelling performed by honours Department of Drama students.

Our academic engagement continues to thrive as well, with Kirsten Krause's MA Fine Art exhibition, *(Re)presentations*, which explored decolonial exhibition strategies and brought underrepresented works from our storage into the spotlight. The UP Museums actively support over 20 academic modules, making the institutional collections an essential part of student life and integral to research programmes at the university.

Finally, we're thrilled to announce that progress has been made with over 1,241 items from our collection, including works by Hezekiel Ntuli (1912-1973), that are now available on **Google Arts & Culture**, expanding global access to UP's rich heritage. Adding to our digital transformation efforts, the photography project of 174 objects from the specifically declared Mapungubwe Collection is now complete, preserving this unique part of our national estate for future generations.

Thank you for being a part of this journey with us, and to the sustained support from all academic departments, external partners and collaborators, staff, students, and dedicated museum patrons, we hope you have a blooming September.

Digitisation Heritage Project

The specifically declared Mapungubwe Collection gets photographed




The photography project commissioned to Thania Louw from Art2Motion was a major curatorial project spanning several months. This initiative for the specifically declared Mapungubwe Collection actively promotes the digitisation of cultural heritage to enhance its safeguarding, accessibility and preservation for future generations. The principle of leveraging technology is enshrined by UNESCO, and UP Museums are not only updating their documentation of the national estate but will intensify efforts in the coming year so that the Mapungubwe Collection will incrementally become more available on wider digital platforms.

New Acquisitions



Mary Sibande (b.1982) Leisurely Sailing: Sophie with her Binoculars, 2025 Woodcut 765mm x 1050mm

Filling a much-needed gap in the University of Pretoria's art collection on contemporary artists is a new acquisition of *Leisurely Sailing: Sophie with her Binoculars* by Mary Sibande (b. 1982). Through a multidisciplinary practice that includes sculpture and graphic works, Sibande reclaims agency for the Black female body in post-apartheid South Africa, challenging and rewriting her family's history of domestic work. Sibande's alter ego, Sophie, appears in vivid garments of Victorian-era domestic worker uniforms.

Adding another magnificent piece of artwork to the institutional art collection is a work by the inimitable sculptor and sketch artist, Sidney Kumalo (1935-1988). *Untitled (Dancing Woman)* was done in 1982 when Kumalo had already developed a steady following in the South African art market as a sculptor. His drawings are often overlooked, yet they provide a much-needed glimpse into his flowing drawing style that was so prevalent in the 1980s Black art movements in South Africa.

This new acquisition is a series of four separate stamp-inspired editions of silkscreen prints by Masonwabe Ntloko, titled *Transkei* (2024). Ntloko is a visual artist, illustrator, and textile design graduate known for his modern heritage style that blends cultural richness with contemporary expression, with his art deeply rooted in his Xhosa culture. His works mostly entwine his heritage and personal experiences, which he intricately weaves into his visual narratives.

Re(present)ation: Selected Narratives of the University of Pretoria Museum Collection is a beautiful, thoughtful, practice-led curatorial research project by a Masters Fine Arts student, Kirsten Krause, that explored the University of Pretoria's Museum Collection. The exhibition was held in the Student Gallery from 15 to 27 August. Krause kindly hosted members from UP Museums for an informative curatorial walkabout through her exhibition and to express her appreciation. Her exhibition engaged the art archive as an incomplete story, one filled with gaps, contradictions, and silences where both presence and absence matter. Her exhibition deliberately invited multiple interpretations and questioned artworks and their meaning. This was purposefully done to reflect on the act of revisiting objects, interrogating how they have previously been displayed, and representing alternative peoples, histories, and cultural contexts that have often been overlooked or excluded. The UP Museums welcomed the opportunity to be part of her curatorial vision and the collaboration with the Department of Visual Arts.
