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

The *Future Africa* - *1 HOPE* (International *One Planet for One Health Education* Initiative) webinar series aims to build collaborative transdisciplinary (TD) research capacity of early career and doctoral students through a One Health & Well-Being lens.

- Main goals:

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

<u>Series Overview – George Lueddeke</u>

This webinar series stems from a <u>University of Pretoria</u> proposal to the <u>UNICEF</u> Humanitarian Programme through its flagship programme "Generation Unlimited" to collaborate with the University on areas that can advance training and skills for the youth in humanitarian aspects.

Within this coordinated response the webinar series forms part of the University of Pretoria, *<u>Future Africa</u>* project **"Youth empowerment under health/economic crisis"** –

with participation of Humanities, Health Sciences, Education, Economic Sciences, Natural and Agricultural Sciences and Veterinary Science.



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Series Overview – George Lueddeke

The focus of the Future Africa project is on the UNICEF Generation Unlimited Outcome Area 4: "Covid-19 and other Emerging Science for Society Outcomes"

It specifically incorporates the One Health (OH) concept of:

- a collaborative, multi-sectoral, and transdisciplinary approach
- working at the local, regional, national, and global levels –
- with the goal of achieving optimal health [and well-being] outcomes
- recognising the interconnection between people, animals, plants and their shared environment.













- It is increasingly becoming clear that a OH approach has stimulated modern societies to rapidly adopt measures to:
- - save lives (humanitarian),
- - protect livelihoods (social dynamics and human solidarity), and
- - safeguard nature (ecosystem red lines) to reduce the risk of future pandemics (resilience, preparedness, precaution).

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

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

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
