Our Tuks teams performed very well throughout the Northerns League. In the women's premier division, our Tuks 1 ladies came tie second in the premier league, while our Tuks 2 ladies finished top of the reserve league with 21 points, Tuks 3 ladies secured 5th in the second division, and Tuks 4 ladies finishing 7th in the third division.

In the men's premier division, our Tuks 1 men, the Redsox, finished 3rd, with Tuks 2 men placing tie 3rd in the reserve league and our Tuks 3 men ended 7th in the second division. Although our Tuks HP men did not participate in the league this year, they played 13 games against top-level teams, winning 10. Additionally, our Masters men were not only victorious in their league but also won a Cup following their league.

Our Tuks 1 Ladies and HP Men recently travelled to Johannesburg for the annual USSA tournament, where they showcased exceptional hockey. Both teams rose to the occasion, with each of them winning gold. We are so incredibly proud of both these teams.

TuksHockey is home to incredible athletes whose successes extend beyond our blue Astro. At the senior IPT, we had 38 athletes, 3 coaches and 1 manager representing Northerns, with 6 athletes selected for the SA U21 teams. The Northerns men finished 4th, and the women finishing 1st, while the SA U21 ladies placed 4th and the men finished 1st.

While we don't have an indoor hockey sector, we celebrate the achievements of three ladies who will represent South Africa at the 2024 Indoor World Cup in Croatia.



I would like to take a moment to congratulate our remarkable Olympians, Calvin and Edith and of course, Sigz in your capacity as the South African assistant men's coach. Your dedication, countless hours of hard work, and unwavering commitment have truly paid off. Edith, this marks your second Olympic games appearance, while Calv, this is your first. Calvins Davis captains the Northerns U21 side to 2024 IPT victory

TuksHockey players were instrumental in getting Northerns to win the 2024 Under-21 Interprovincial tournament in Cape Town.

This past weekend, Northerns beat Western Province 3-2 in the final to win the title. UP-Tuks student-athlete, Calvin Davis captained the team and was also named Player of the Tournament for his outstanding performance, including scoring against Western Province. During the tournament, it must have felt to him like any other day on the Astroturf, as 15 of his teammates were also playing. Kagiso Mathaba of Tuks guided the junior team as the head coach.

Davis is, however, quick to say that it was not an all-out Tuks effort that led to them being champions.

"CJ Mashele and Xolani Ncube from TUT stepped up and contributed whenever they played. The reality is that it's never easy coming into a team with 16 Tuks players. To see how CJ and Xolani kept playing better with every game was special.

"I am proud of how every player did what was expected. In the buildup to the tournament, we talked a lot about not being a passenger in the team environment. Our success came from understanding that you'll not always be your best the whole tournament but peaking at the right time. We grew 10% each game.

"My standout moment was our group game against Western Province; we went 0-1 down to them to draw 2-2. We dominated the game, although being the 'underdogs'. Knowing we could win the tournament gave the team a lot of belief and confidence.

"If I have to give credit to anyone, it would be Daniel Den Bakker and Taine Tanner-Ellis. They were both crucial in our midfield, whether taking on opponents, keeping possession or creating opportunities for our strikers."

Davis is being modest. He ended up being the player of the tournament. On SA Hockey's website, his heroics in the final are worded as follows: "Calvin Davis, who has stood up as one of the tournament stars, is knocking on the door of international selection for the senior national team. He gave Northern Blues the lead in the 36th minute with a superb reverse stick strike across the goal into the bottom right corner."

Corne Burger scored first for Northerns with a drag flick. Warrick Adams scored the winning goal.

When Davis asked what he thinks his contribution to the team's success was, he said he felt he brought a sense of urgency yet calm mindset to the team.

"We spoke about trust throughout the tournament and keeping things simple. My challenge as captain was to keep everyone on the same page with each game. I also brought experience to the side. It was not the first time I played an under-21 final before. I also played for the SA under-21 side."

The NorthensU-21 women's team finished third, beating WP Peninsula 3-2. A total of 15 players from Tuks were in the side.

Dewar brothers don't just play for tuks - they live it

In 2017, the British rock band 10cc was singing about how they don't like cricket but love it; this sums up how the Dewar brothers, Matt and Alex, feel about hockey at Tuks.

A sixth-year medical student, Matt says playing hockey is a way for him to take a break from academics.

"I genuinely love playing hockey. Studying and playing go hand in hand. I can't imagine the one without the other."

Alex, the younger one studying to become a teacher, will tell you how he finds himself on the Astroturf playing around with a stick and ball when frustrated or stressed. It helps him get a new perspective on things. As he got older, hockey became his real passion.

Matt's love for hockey started when he was a youngster beside the Astroturf, watching his dad, Andrew; try to outsmart opponents with innovative stick work and fleet footedness dribbling the ball. History seemingly repeats itself, as Alex's first memory of hockey is watching his brother play.

Matt has been playing for Tuks for the last six years. His highlights include being part of the Tuks team to have won the USSA Hockey Championships twice (2021 and 2023) and the Varsity Hockey. He has also played for the South African under-21-side. Alex made his debut last year playing for Tuks' B-team.

"It is exciting to have my younger brother also playing at Tuks. It is the thing you dream of coming from playing together in our back garden as kids. As yet, we have not played that often on the same team, but every time we do, it is special. It is nice to have my younger brother having my back. He will tell you the same."

Both brothers are midfielders. As to their best traits, Matt said, "I bring calmness to the team, being able to keep a level head in pressure situations. I also have a good tactical awareness of what 'we' want to achieve. Off the field, I like to mentor younger players. I am always open to chatting about tactics and the game."

Alex prides himself on being one of the fitter players on any team.

"I can drag flick when needed, but I am more the player who will set up a goal, putting someone else in a position to score. My brother is, without a doubt, my biggest role model. He has influenced the way I think about the game.

"The most important thing he taught me is that there are no shortcuts to succeeding in sport. My brother and I are not the most talented players, but we keep playing better through hard work."

The Dewar brothers are not the only siblings playing for Tuks. There is also Tegan and Cerian Fourie. Both sisters have represented South Africa. Tegan is the Tuks' first team's cocaptain.

Luke and Elne Lourens are both playing for Tuks' A-teams. Luke joined the club last year and his sister this year. Tristan and Ethan Crawford have both been long-term committed players at the club.

Hockey is the one thing that is guaranteed to get the Lourens siblings, Luke and Elne's adrenaline pumping. For them, something is to be said about being on the ball with a stick in hand, trying to outsmart opponents.

There would be no better time to do so than next month during the USSA Hockey Championships in Johannesburg. Luke already knows what it takes to win, as last year, he played for the Tuks men's team, which was crowned champions.

Elne will be making her debut for Tuks at a major tournament. If she is to be believed, it could be a scenario of who let the dogs out.

"I kinda have a 'Jack Russell' attitude when playing hockey. I want to be in the midst of the action all the time. I don't like to lose, so I will put my body on the line for my team. My best quality is playing to make my teammates look good."

Apart from being a big fan of how the Dutch women's hockey team plays, Elne credits her brother as someone who influences how she thinks about the game.

"I have been a big supporter of my brother since I was young. When I am down and doubt my abilities, he asks whether I am a quitter or am going soft. You know how brothers can be. I admire his belief that nothing is impossible if you put in the hard work."

Elne played as a Tuks defender and in the midfield while at school.

"Our coach, Inky (Zondi), talked long with me, explaining why he wanted me to play as a defender. I am sure he can see a future for me even if I can't see it right now. For now, it is a big learning curve for me, taking me to the next level."

Luke has the distinction of having played for and against Tuks. In 2022, he was on the Wits team, facing off against the Tuks in the varsity final. Tuks won.

He also plays as a defender but has the art of drag flicking tuned down to fine art. Those who have seen him play describe his technique as that which would make Thor, the god of Thunder, proud.

According to Luke, being good as a drag-flicker requires hours and hours of practice.

"Everything is about timing and utter focus. I go into a bubble during a game, blocking out everything around me. It is similar to rugby when a flyhalf lines up to kick a vital penalty goal or conversion."

As to role models, Luke said, "I am my person on the Astroturf, but I am an avid student of the game. This means I continuously seek ways to improve my play."

No regrets are what Edith Molikoe hopes for when the referee's whistle is blown for the last time during the Paris 2024 Olympic Games women's hockey tournament.

South Africa starts their Olympic campaign on Sunday, playing Australia at 12:45. The men's team is playing against the Netherlands on Saturday (12:45).

Molikoe is no stranger to playing hockey at the Olympics. She debuted in 2021 at the Tokyo Olympics. Her fondest memory at the time was being able to play against people she had always looked up to, being around top athletes and learning from them and how to be an elite athlete.

"To me, it was like, oh my word. I am in the same place as athletes I have only seen on television."

But this time around, things are different. Molikoe has 34 caps playing for the Proteas. At the start of the month, she co-captained Tuks to victory during the USSA Tournament played in Johannesburg. It proves she has matured as a player.

The UP-Tuks student-athlete is realistic about what awaits the team on Paris's AstroTurf. South Africa (18th on the world rankings) is considered the least favourite in their group. Their most brutal game will be against the second-ranked Argentina. Australia is ranked 5th.

"Experience has taught me not to take anything for granted in sport. Sometimes things will be for your team, and sometimes they won't. I think if we can stay in the moment in Paris and be present for every game, we might surprise ourselves. From a personal perspective, I want to learn from the best how to play better. More importantly, I would not want to return home with regrets and feeling like I could have done more."

Molikoe who plays as a midfielder considers her best attributes as a player her distribution skills. Adding.

"And I'm a I'm a very technical player. It means I can throw overheads. I can snap. I can hit. So that's what I bring to the team, but also my speed, my communication, and as well as the ability to read the game."

The TuksHockey player is an unashamed daddy's girl. Her father, John, has inspired her to never accept anything below average.

To this day, Molikoe, the TuksHockey women's captain, remembers her father's words: "Keep going. There's no looking back. Once you've started something, the only way is to move forward."

She has taken these words to heart.

"My dad is also the one who told me to respect my opponents—actually, everyone I meet. And nothing beats hard work and dedication."

Lilly-Anne Theron thrives on the challenge of guarding the net

A BSportSci student, Theron is passionate about the unique challenges that come with being a goalkeeper. "Hockey is the ultimate game for me," she says. "I've tried many sports, but hockey's physicality and demands on fitness make it stand out. Some think being a keeper is dangerous, but to me, it's thrilling."

Theron's journey began when she watched her sister's hockey practice. Seeing a group of goalkeepers diving and sliding to stop the ball inspired her to take on the challenge. By Grade Five, when the call came for a volunteer to play goalkeeper, her hand shot up immediately.

In her style of play, Theron explains, "I stay on my feet and prefer not to dive unnecessarily. I'm vocal on the field, guiding my defence because, as a keeper, I see the entire game unfolding. My role is to read the game and help my teammates adjust accordingly."

When asked about the pressure of penalty shootouts, Theron shares, "It can be stressful, but I focus on stalling the player. I pray for calmness and try to read the opponent's skills. Knowing the players helps me anticipate their moves."

Theron's love for the game and her tactical approach make her an invaluable asset to TuksHockey, and her best is surely yet to come.





TuksHockey: Tuks players shine in South African hockey throughout 2024

One of the standout achievements in South African men's hockey in 2024 is the South African under-21 national field hockey team being crowned senior provincial champions. It's a rare feat—one that few can recall happening before. The team also secured victory in the Interprovincial Tournament, adding to their accolades. With sustainable management and guidance, these talented young players have the potential to become one of South Africa's finest hockey teams at the upcoming Olympic Games cycles.

Speaking with UP-Tuks student-athlete Jamie Seale, who plays for the South African under-21 side, it becomes evident why the team has dominated the local hockey scene in 2024. Seale attributes much of his mindset and success to lessons from his father, a former hockey enthusiast.

"My dad always told me that when I step onto the Astroturf, I should remember that no player is better than me. I carry that mindset into every game. I wasn't alone in this; our whole team believed we could win every match we played," Seale shared.

He also praised their coach, Guy Elliot, for his motivating leadership during the final against Southern Gauteng. "Coach Elliot kept reminding us that if we stuck to the game plan, we would make history. That belief kept us going," Seale added.

Seale, who plays as a midfielder, took on the role of outside midfielder for the South African under-21 team. When asked about his strengths, he emphasised his dynamic style of play on the field.

"I rely on my speed, stickwork, and dribbling skills. I can take on multiple players and create opportunities that can change the course of any game. My ability to read the game allows me to be in the right place at the right time to score," he explained.

Meanwhile, Tegan Fourie's leadership has also made a mark. She captained the Tuks women's team to victory at the USSA Hockey Championships and co-captained the Northerns Blues side that won the senior Interprovincial Tournament.

For Fourie, effective leadership is about simplicity and setting a strong example. "I always put the team first. As a midfielder, I know that staying composed is crucial. A big part of my game is distribution, setting up our attacking plays. Over my three years as captain for Tuks, I've learned the importance of communicating with my teammates, constantly encouraging and guiding them on the field," she said.

With players like Seale and Fourie stepping up both on and off the field, TuksHockey continues to leave a significant mark on South African hockey in 2024.


