2023 has been a year of many firsts for our women's rugby program. The first time we have introduced a 15s program, which ran simultaneously to our 7s program. The first time our, now known as FNB UP-Tuks 1, women's team competed in the FNB Women's Varsity Cup. The first time our team competed in the BBRU Women's League. With all these first steps being taken expectations were not set too high, however the ladies program proved themselves.

During preparations for the first ever FNB Women's Varsity Cup, the programs biggest challenge was recruiting registered students. In addition to that the team did not have a lot of time to prepare for the tournament. Women's program coordinator, Libbie Janse van Rensburg, says "We were still figuring out the in's and out's of participating in this tournament, and making it to the semi-finals with all the challenges that we faced is something the club is really proud of." Janse van Rensburg then added, "We have learnt a lot from this tournament and will use these learnings to prepare for the 2024 tournament." Looking at the BBRU Women's League, the way to the semi-finals, another astonishing achievement for our newly formed team. Women's head coach, Lizanne Jacobs, said one of the biggest struggles she faced as a coach was the lack of numbers, although this was something to be expected as it was the team's first year, because the season was quite long there were a few injuries which creeped in and this hindered the teams performance towards the end.

Following the BBRU Women's League the players shifted their focus to preparations for the 2023 USSA tournament. The team unfortunately came short in the final against NWU but it was very evident that our ladies were amongst the best. Player welfare manager, Mandla Mdaka, mentioned how impressed he was with our women's team. He had not

previously seen the ladies play but said the skill level of our players are above and beyond the rest and he hopes that the women's program continues to receive the necessary funding if not more as he feels they really proved themselves
