
### What is One Health?

One Health is an approach that recognizes that the health of people is closely connected to the health of animals and our shared environment. In the spirit of transdisciplinary interactions, the One Health symposium is held to bring together specialists from human, animal and environmental health to discuss the importance of the OH approach in advancing research and training at the University of Pretoria.



#### What are common One Health Issues?

One Health issues include zoonotic diseases, antimicrobial resistance, food safety and food security, vector-borne diseases, environmental contamination, and other health threats shared by people, animals, and the environment. Successful public health interventions require the cooperation of human, animal, and environmental health partners to communicate, collaborate on and coordinate activities.

It's a timely initiative that gives scientists and advocates a powerful voice for moving beyond current provincial approaches to various problems, to a holistic default way of doing business.
