Introduction

The overarching vision of the University of Pretoria is to be a leading research-intensive university in Africa, recognised internationally for its quality, relevance and impact- developing people, creating knowledge and making a difference locally and globally. Within the context of this vision, it is necessary to have unique centres of scholarship that can contribute to the development of outstanding research endeavours. A first tentative step in this direction was taken in 1999 when the University established the Unit for Advanced Scholarship that was an early attempt to enhance multidisciplinary research through the interactive participation of individuals from various academic disciplines. The growth of the Unit was however held back by the lack of appetite to make the investment that would give it a physical presence and by its status as a 'Unit' versus a 'Centre'. A 'Unit' is the lowest level of academic entity that is recognised by the Senate and is generally located in a single faculty. A 'Centre' enjoys higher status as an entity that has a multi-faculty footprint. Furthermore, a lack of clear focus meant that the 'Unit' became an affiliation for a number of good scholars who pursued their own research initiatives without engaging in a meaningful way.

In order to rectify these deficiencies, the Unit for Advanced Scholarship was closed and the Centre for the Advancement of Scholarship established with a physical location in 2013. The central purpose of the Centre is to provide a locus for undertaking and debating new ideas in an environment in which there can be an interaction between senior scholars, eminent visiting scholars, postgraduate students and postdoctoral fellows. The Centre provides the required intellectual home for both senior scholars and postgraduate students and encourages engagement in scholarly debates across disciplines, with an emphasis on the contribution of the Humanities and Social Sciences.

The Centre has six core staff members and hosts research fellows, visiting scholars, post-doctoral fellows, and postgraduate students. The director of the centre is Professor Crewe and the deputy director is Prof James Ogude, Mrs Martie Marneweck is the management assistant, Mr Harry Ntombela the project manager, Mrs Cecelia Samson the administrative assistant and Mrs Cecilia Bailie is the assistant to Prof van Onselen.

MEMBERSHIP OF CHCI

In early of 2013, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation made an officer's grant to the University of Pretoria in order for three representatives (Prof Norman Duncan, Prof Robin Crewe and Prof Sakhela Buhlungu) to attend the annual meeting of the Consortium for Humanities Centres and Institutes (CHCI) and to visit a number of Humanities Centres in the UK and the USA, in order to assist with designing the focus and activities of the Centre for the Advancement of Scholarship, which was set to open in July 2013. The visit was helpful in clarifying the direction that the Centre would take and the Centre became a member of the CHCI (one of three such centres in South Africa).

The Annual meeting of the CHCI in 2014 was held in Hong Kong and attended by the deputy director of the Centre, Prof James Ogude. At the meeting he had discussions with colleagues from The Trinity College of Dublin Long Room Hub. They are Dr Charles Travis, Senior Research Fellow of the Trinity Long Room Hub, Prof Poul Holm, Professor of Environmental History at Trinity College, Dublin. The Trinity Long Room Hub is a member of the Andrew W. Mellon European Observatory of the New Human Condition. This observatory is studying the 'wicked problems' that require human behaviour change in order to address the long term effects of current behaviour. Addressing the so-called 'wicked problems' was one of the key elements of the discussion with regard to the Future Africa Initiative's activities (see p 19).

A Skype discussion will be held with Dr Travis and Prof Holm in March 2015 in order to see whether a collaborative project can be developed in the area of environmental humanities. They will visit our Centre early in April 2015 to make presentations regarding their work and for us to engage further with them. This engagement will also extend to a discussion of the Digital Arts and Humanities PhD program that they offer.

Prof Ogude attended a recent executive committee meeting that was held at the Stellenbosch institute for Advanced Study (STIAS) and is exploring with the other members of the committee, the possibility of hosting an Annual Meeting in South Africa.



From The Director

The early part of 2013 was taken up with planning the establishment of the Centre and overseeing the completion of the renovations to Old College House. The visits to the humanities centres in the UK and the US were instrumental in guiding us to the conclusion that the Centre would be a place for multidisciplinary research with a particular focus on the Humanities and the Social Sciences. The renovations to Old College House were finally completed in June 2013 and the director and a number of fellows moved into the building in July 2013 and set about making the Centre operational. This included searching for support staff and making provision for housing the four projects that are associated with the Centre. The official launch of the Centre was hosted by the Vice-Chancellor and Principal on 21st November 2013 and was attended by broad array of the University community. Since that formal ceremony, the Centre has been charting the course of its future activities and navigating its interactions with other University entities.

In addition, the development of the African Leadership Initiative and its location on University's experimental farm will provide the Centre with significant opportunities for interaction. Furthermore, it will provide accommodation in the future for some of the Centre's visiting scholars in ideal tranquil surroundings.

The details of the activities, functions and the scholarly environment that the Centre provides are contained in the body of the annual report and will give you a brief glimpse of what has been accomplished.

The Centre has become a reality through the individuals who participate in its activities as senior research fellows, visiting research fellows, research associates, postdoctoral fellows and doctoral students. In addition, the support and enthusiasm of the Vice-Chancellor and Principal. Prof. Cheryl de la Rey for the establishment of the Centre has been a crucial element in its successful establishment.

Finally, I would like to thank our support staff for helping us to invent the centre and working so enthusiastically to make its activities a success.

Dr Moon's research is titled "The Political Economy of Developmental State-making in South Africa", and it traces state-making processes over the past 100 years, and underlines the primacy and centrality of politics and ideas (ideational factors) in shaping and conditioning the character of the state. Specifically, that the prospects for developmental state-making in contemporary South Africa hinge on the introduction of different politics (including a developmental leadership) and a new 'Big Idea' for change. This refers to the structure and institutions of the economy, the economic strategy and regime of accumulation. A bad or flawed idea "economic strategy" cannot be expected to produce excellent developmental outcomes.

Research Projects

Although having been in existence for just over a year, the Centre for the Advancement of Scholarship has made significant strides in fulfilling its mandate of creating a conducive environment for interdisciplinary research and participation, and counts among its achievements the different collaborative research Initiatives currently housed in its confines. These are detailed as follows:

Ubuntu Research Project (Funded by the Templeton Foundation)

Professor James Ogude, Professor Julian Muller, Dr Wilhelm van Deventer, Professor Christof Heyns and Professor Maxi Schoeman

This project, 'The meaning and value of Ubuntu in human and social development in Africa', is an inter-faculty research project involving departments and researchers from the Faculties of Humanities, Law and Theology.

Ubuntu is the African idea of personhood: persons depend on other persons to be. This is summarized in the expression: *umuntu ngumuntu ngabantu*, that is, a person is a person through persons.

The project seeks to insert the concept of Ubuntu within the broad intellectual debate on self and community, to demonstrate its intellectual and philosophical value and theoretical grounding on known practices emanating from the African continent and indeed how it works to unsettle some of our received notions of the self. The project looks at Ubuntu from an array of viewpoints, especially its applicability in different contexts and facets explored in the four research clusters.

The project is comprised of four clusters, the first cluster headed by Professor Ogude focuses on gaining an understanding of the multiple interpretations of the Ubuntu concept. It looks into the reconciliation of the values of Ubuntu which conceives the individual as nodal point of larger communal networks with the notion of the individual as a free and intentional agent. The value of this cluster resides in the possibilities it offers to see Ubuntu as a bridge to the other cultural streams rather than an insular and separatist ideology which shuts off other philosophical streams. This cluster held a major colloquium attended by local and international scholars of African philosophy and Ubuntu to debate some of these issues from 23 – 25 June 2014 at the Centre for the Advancement of Scholarship, University of Pretoria.

Cluster one is to develop a proposal for a book manuscript based on proceedings of the colloquium, and a deep literature review on 'personhood' in an attempt to expand its meaning and provide a nuanced understanding that would draw connections between African and Christian world views, and indeed other related or competing ideas of personhood. This will be followed by a workshop on personhood scheduled for February 2015.

Cluster two is headed by Professor Julian Muller and Dr van Deventer, this cluster plans to conduct research on the 2007 Kenya post-election violence, as well as the Zimbabwean inter-ethnic violence of the 80's. Two meetings were held in Pretoria which was used to guide the different researchers in planning their projects. They have all started with both literature reviews and empirical research in the form of qualitative interviews. Under this cluster; Professor Ogude visited Kenya in August 2014 to identify the relevant literature and documentaries on the 2007 Kenya post-election violence. The Zimbabwean component consists of 2 PhD students working in the Bulawayo area.

Cluster three is headed by Professor Christof Heyns and is to compile a classification of violations of the right to life, and collate relevant reports from across Africa. Research on extractive industries and the protection of the right to life has begun, as has research on the reform of the range of documents related to the right to life.

Cluster four, headed by Professor Maxi Schoeman is conducting desktop reviews of various issues related to Ubuntu, responsibility to protect and social cohesion.

Significant Accomplishments:

Cluster One

This cluster completed a proposal for an edited book manuscript for Indiana University Press which has tentatively accepted to publish the proceedings of the colloquium held at the end of June 2014.

Revised papers from the colloquium have started coming in for review. The proposal has been sent to the line editor and a discussion on the timelines for publication will take place in November. Deep literature review on the idea of personhood with the aim of expanding its layered meanings has so far yielded promising insights. The work will culminate in a workshop and a public lecture on 'personhood' in February 2015.

Cluster Two

A diverse and capable research group with no less than 7 members working at PhD and postdoctoral levels on the related area of Ubuntu and personal narratives among faith communities in South Africa and Zimbabwe has been recruited. Two workshops were held with this group of students and post-doctoral fellows which were very successful and all of them are enthusiastically involved in their different projects. A leading peer-reviewed journal (*Verbum et Ecclesia*), has agreed to publish a special Ubuntu-edition in 2015 out of some of the research output by the researchers and the cluster leaders, Prof Müller and Dr van Deventer.

Prof Ogude undertook a preliminary field trip to Kenya in August 2014, in which he discovered a significant body of literature and resource material focussing on the narratives of the displaced, all of which should provide the necessary entry point into the research on the narratives of affected communities and what ethical values underpin their search for healing and restoration. He also identified sites and locations of the Internally Displaced Persons (IDP), almost six years since the violence took place. Of significance was the tentative discovery of the role the church and faith communities continue to play in mediating the relationships between displaced communities and the state actors and in supporting the displaced in a variety of ways.

Cluster Three

Networks have been created with organisations and individuals with expertise on issues of transitional justice, customary law, and policing in Africa. Two post-graduate PhD researchers from the University of Pretoria have been recruited to assist with creating a template surveying commissions of inquiry implicating the right to life across Africa over the last twenty years. Work has begun with a leading expert of African customary law, Thandabantu Nhlapo, of the University of Cape Town, in drafting a paper examining historical and modern interpretations of accountability across the African continent.

Cluster 4

Prof Schoeman addressed two audiences (one in Helsinki, Finland and one in Uppsala, Sweden, on normative and ethical issues related to the relationship between Ubuntu and government policies. These panel discussions were arranged as part of various events celebrating and commemorating South Africa's twenty years of democracy. South Africa's ambassadors (to Finland and Sweden respectively) attended these discussions which took place on 23 and 25 September 2014.

The Centre for the Study of Governance Innovation (GovInn)

Professor Lorenzo Fioramonti and Dr Ward Anseeuw

This centre is Africa's first research institution entirely dedicated to governance innovation. GovInn specialises on environmental governance, alternative economic development, sustainable regional integration, low carbon economy, and governance of the commons, including natural resources, food, energy and climate. Since 2009, GovInn has been coordinating international research projects on global development policies, multilateral governance, regional integration processes and measurement of economic performance. GovInn is currently leading the Africa/South Africa component of a 3-year international research programme dealing with energy cooperation and inter-regional environmental governance between Africa, Europe and the Americas.

A new research stream has just been created to focus on new modes of governance for common resources, which will deal specifically with local institutions and civil society in South Africa. Globally, GovInn collaborates with the Ecologic Institute in Berlin, the Getulio Vargas Foundation in Brazil, the Johns Hopkins University in the US and the School of Environmental Studies at the University of East Anglia.

Human Economy Project (Funded by Andrew W. Mellon Foundation)

Professors Keith Hart and John Sharp

The research project seeks to answer how the economy might become more human. Economies were always human, of course, in that people are indispensable to them; but how human interests are expressed in the dominant economies of our world is less obvious. It explores economy from the vantage point of people's concrete activities and aspirations, while taking in the human predicament as a whole. Southern Africa and the global South is the principal focus. The current world crisis provides a context for addressing the sources of inequality and devising development strategies based on what people want and are doing already.

Some 20 post-doctoral fellows from Africa, Asia, the Americas and Europe have been appointed; and in 2012 an inter-disciplinary group of eight African PhD students from five countries was appointed and their main research focus is on Southern Africa with the participants bringing research expertise from many geographical areas.

Capital Cities: Space Justice and Belonging project

Professor Alan Mabin

Capital cities in young electoral democracies focus the construction sites of justice and belonging in numerous ways and are home to the contestations, debates and engagements out of which something new is born.

Fundamental questions about human condition in the city need to be addressed to realize the potential of a capital city to contribute to unity, peace, cohesion and creative development of people and democracy. To do this, new vocabularies are needed and new practices of working across the traditional disciplines of urban design, architecture, engineering, urban planning and the institutional development of government.

The Capital Cities Project is an exciting and new cross-faculty research project initiated by the Faculty of Humanities, but involving several other faculties within the University of Pretoria community. Researchers and postgraduate students from the Faculties of Humanities; Law; Health Sciences; Natural and Agricultural Sciences; Engineering, Built Environment and Information Technology; Theology; and Economic and Management Sciences will collaborate by asking new questions about the city of Pretoria/Tshwane as a city, and as a capital city. The uniqueness of capital cities in general and our capital city in particular, will be investigated from the viewpoint of a variety of disciplines including arts and language, architecture and urban planning, social work, criminology, law, history, drama, psychology, anthropology, political science and economics.

The overall aim of the project is to create a platform for coherent research on and intervention in the city and other capital cities. This common meeting ground will facilitate and coordinate interaction among role-players that engage the City of Tshwane by their research and practice. The project will form a node around which postgraduate training and postdoctoral support can be organised, and from which the leveraging of funding will be facilitated. Collaboration with other universities, local and international communities and governmental departments and municipalities is envisaged.

The Capital Cities Project represents an invitation by the University of Pretoria to the residents of the city, civil society and public authorities on all levels, as well as international communities, to engage one another in theory and practice about the capital cities in which we live, and the capital cities in which we want to live.

Public Sector and Policy Research

Professor Sibusiso Vil-Nkomo

South African public sector research lacks vigorous study and analysis. This field has largely been understood from an applied approach. As South Africa defines itself as a democratic developmental state and an emerging market economy it has become imperative to produce research outputs that would generate epistemology or new knowledge that is appropriate. The research must also contribute to the body of knowledge that can be replicated in other parts of the world. This is important because South Africa has been integrated into the world system. Furthermore the research agenda is inspired by the work of persons like Vito Tanzi who has examined the changing role of the state versus the markets.

The research looks at public economics, income maintenance and distribution policy, economics of poverty and development policy, public service research – service delivery and the science of implementation, policy alternatives, political economy of development and urban and regional political economy and policy.

Chemical Structural/Scientific Software development and Research

Since the introduction of a Scientific Cluster Computer in 2009, a substantial development in advanced Material Science emerged at the University of Pretoria. Material Science is involved in the development of computer software and a variety of materials, such as, polymers, semi-conductors, emulsions etc. Four departments across two faculties utilise the Scientific Cluster Computer for a variety of Chemical, Physical and Chemical engineering applications tied to a substantial number of PHD and MSc degree studies, resulting in a large number of peer reviewed articles been successfully completed using this facility as a main driving force.

The University of Pretoria became a formal member of the international "consortium" group of Material software and application developers on the 5th November 2008 in Taos New Mexico USA, hosted by the Materials Design Inc. group managed from Paris France. This occasion was preceded by Dr Jannie Pretorius's formal lecture to the consortium, covering the disciplines of: Catalysis, UV-spectroscopy to trace reaction kinetics. Collaboration with the consortium members (across the world) was sustained through infrequent attendance of the annual technical workshop meetings, which facilitated growth and led to the eventually request to the University of Pretoria Executive for a financial contribution to undertake a formal Scientific Cluster System upgrade. This step included a substantial financial contribution from IBM as well, and made it possible for a 2013 240-Central Processing Unit upgrade of the Scientific Cluster Computer as well as the formal establishment of Material Sciences in four departments and across two faculties. The upgraded system contributed to the completion of five PHD's, four MSc studies and ten publications across the four Departments. Continued improvement of the underlying LINUX operating system conditions, application software capability and system buffers have become an important part of the support for this installation, which now will be expanded further with an upgrade to support all Molecular based modelling requirements in Chemistry Department, Weather Simulation and the Mathematics Department.

Cluster one

A workshop on ‘personhood’, intended to inform the work of the other clusters, is planned for February 2015. At the same times, a public lecture, open to the University community and the broader public will be held. Prof Ogude and Prof Muller are planning a workshop with Associate Researchers from Kenya and Uganda in late February / early March, 2015, covering violently displaced faith communities in Kenya and Northern Uganda.

A special Ubuntu-edition of the accredited online journal, *Verbum et Ecclesia*, has been negotiated. Dr Wilhelm van Deventer acts as the editor for this edition and will work closely together with the general editor of the journal, Prof Dirk Human. About 10 articles will be written by members of the research group and will cover different themes, all linked to Ubuntu. The articles are due for submission by the end of November after which they will undergo the normal blind peer review process of the journal. The publication date is 2015

Prof Müller visited the Centre for Narrative Enquiry at the University of Bristol, UK, during October 2014.
