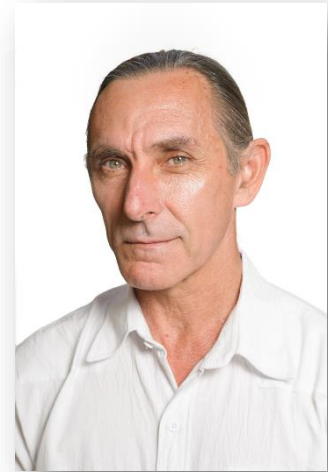


Prof Jannie Hugo

Professor Jannie Hugo has held the position of Head of Family Medicine at the University of Pretoria for the past 10 years. He is leading this large department, implementing Community-Oriented Primary Health Care in the City of Tshwane with a focus on the integration of care between home, clinic and hospital. This includes development of Community-Oriented Primary Care and the development of Subdistrict Multi-Disciplinary Teams in Tshwane as well as Gauteng Province. The UP COPC Research Unit acts as a platform for research within this service delivery and education vehicle. The Unit is leading the UP Team to implement NHI in partnership with Department of Health and 5 other universities. He worked for 17 years at Medunsa (Medical University of Southern Africa) where he established the Madibeng Centre for Research of which he is still a board member. He led the initiative to establish the Clinical Associate profession, a mid-level clinician programme in South Africa.



Jannie is active in clinical practice in clinics and district hospitals including serving after hours.

On behalf of Gauteng Department of Health, Jannie is leading a team to developing Sub-district Multi-Disciplinary Teams in all the sub-districts in Gauteng. This includes developing the concept, implementing in Tshwane, leading the SD MDT in Sub-district 3 in Tshwane and running a district and provincial Masterclass in MDT.

From 2015-2017, Jannie was appointed by the Department of Health to the National Health Insurance (NHI) Task Team to develop the parameters of the proposed NHI Bill.
