


## Future Africa at the University of Pretoria

A Dialogue on Informal Settlements Designing for health and healthy people



A health city is "one that continually creates and improves its physical and social environments and expands the community resources that enable people to mutually support each other in performing all the functions of life and developing to their maximum potential" World Health Organisation (WHO). Indicators of a healthy city include a commitment to health that encompasses policy, intersectoral collaboration; political activation, community participation, and industry involvement for innovation. This requires a multi-sectoral trans-disciplinary approach. This dialogue will explore the learnings from an inter and transdisciplinary urban and informal-settlement primary health care perspective presented by a team consisting of medical doctors, dieticians, architects, and agriculturalists. It will engage with communities, government, private sector, non-profit organisations, and other academic and national institutions to create a network for strategic planning and implementation towards a healthy city.
