The Summer School took place from 11 - 13 September 2023 in Bologna, Italy, and was attended by students from Italy, Poland and South Africa. The focus was on theoretical and practical applications of positive psychology to support student well-being and resilience.

The Summer School stems from a fruitful international collaboration between the **Alma Mater Studiorum - Università di Bologna** and the **University of Pretoria**. It aims to **train** new generations of students and PhD candidates within the discipline of **positive psychology** with a strong emphasis on:

- understanding and exploring core concepts in Positive Psychology at personal levels;
- applying these concepts to everyday contexts in order to promote well-being;
- exploring their applications and implications in various cultural contexts.

The Department Showcases Research at the 27th Annual Psychological Society of South Africa (PsySSA) Congress

The Psychological Society of South Africa (PsySSA) held its 27th annual congress and scientific conference from 04 to 06 Oct 2023 at Emperor's Palace in Johannesburg. Staff and students from the <u>Department of Psychology</u> presented several scientific papers and participated in roundtables as well as symposia. Collectively, the presented work showcased a diverse range of impactful and innovative research being done within the department across the fields of health and well-being, professional training and education in psychology, curriculum development and innovation, community psychology interventions, assessment psychology, as well as gender and sexuality.



Professor David Maree participated in the roundtable *Establishing Best Practices in Psychological Assessment in South Africa: Test Classification, Test Certification and the Role of Assessment Standards South Africa.* The discussion focused on the work of <u>ASSA</u>, of which he is a founding member, along with other professionals.



Dr Sonja Mostert presented the paper, *Health Literacy as a Socially Constructed Concept: Recommendations for Intervention Development.* She also co-presented a paper with Dr Jarred Martin on developing a postgraduate module in health psychology.



Dr Anathi Ntozini presented the paper Drug Addiction and Marital Conflicts: Exploring the Experiences of Drug-addicted Wives in Abuja, Nigeria.



Ms Elné Visagie (right) presented two papers; the first, a rapid review titled *Exploring the Role* of *CBT* in the Self-management of *Type 2* Diabetes, offered a comprehensive synthesis of current scientific evidence pertaining to CBT-based interventions and self-management practices. The second paper, *Exploring the* Thoughts, Emotions, and Behaviours Related to the Self-management Practices of Adults with Type 2 Diabetes, delved into the experiences and lives of South African adults. The goal of the research was to shed light on the complex and diverse challenges faced by individuals in their journey towards effective diabetes self-management.



Clinical Supervision in South Africa Improving practice with limited resources

Dr Kamilla Rawatlal published the book, *Clinical Supervision in South Africa: Improving practice with limited resources* (2023), with Springer International. Increasingly South African trainee Psychologists are faced with the responsibility of assuming multiple roles and responsibilities in diverse and sometimes resource limited practice settings.

This publication includes 10 chapters that focus on applying a systemic framework to the development of clinical competencies at the individual, interpersonal and macro-levels of influence to support trainees navigate contemporary practice realities. Various figures and diagrams included in the book highlight how this can be strategically achieved. The need to address self-care, a neglected area in the supervisory space, also informs the critical area of well-being of practitioners and is paid homage to in this publication. The publication will be included as a prescribed book/resource for the practicum module on the Master of Arts (Counselling Psychology) programme in 2024.

Prof Tharina Guse (HOD) also contributed to the Chapter *Towards well-being: Self care in the supervisory space.*
