## **Synopsis**

### **Format**

The explorative piece will be about identifying problems of *connotation* or different ways in which signs convey meaning by stereotypes in a South African landscape.

#### **Director's Note**

When I was tasked with devising a new production for the 1<sup>st</sup> year students, I was excited to

explore this formative talent. However I was cognisant of the fact that in the early stages of

their careers, they need to work on embodying characters. I therefore followed

Stanislavski's technique of building a character. Through this process we managed to

identify stock characters otherwise known as stereotypes. As a director there was yet

another observation I made, and that was the racial and gender divide amongst the cast. As

a process of social cohesion and cultural diversity, I paired the actors and made them swop

their characters. Through this process, we drew inspiration from the *performative* and the

semiotics.

Style

We book-end the production with a "once upon a time..." however the piece is very episodic

with pockets of various storylines.
