# BA Information Design (ID) Intake for 2026

## INTRODUCTION TO ID

The successful information designer (communications designer) is a professional, highly qualified person who plays a decisive strategic role in creating the contemporary visual environment. We live in a world in which we are surrounded by words and pictures and it is the designer's responsibility to provide original solutions to mass communication problems.

- **01.** UP: online application (http://www.up.ac.za/online-application).
- **02.** ID: Submit a digital copy of the ID selection form, which includes a questionnaire and an online portfolio section.
- **03.** ID: Book a provisional appointment for a selection interview and concept test by calling (012) 420 2353. Interviews and selection tests take place from 12 19 July 2025.

## STEP 01

Apply at UP

To ensure that your complete application is received by ID by 30 June 2025, it is strongly advised that you complete and submit your online application on the UP portal at least two weeks before the deadline.

#### **APPLY AT UP**

Only applications that comply with the University's admission requirements will be considered for selection and admission to the BA Information Design course.

The closing date for applications for all selection courses at the University of Pretoria (UP) for 2025 is **30 June 2025**. Apply online at www.up.ac.za/apply. You must consult the UP Portal to track the status of your application.

## **ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS**

### Minimum Admission Requirements

For additional information regarding the minimum admission requirements, visit www.up.ac.za/programmes.

Please make sure that you comply with the following minimum requirements for admission to the BA Information Design course (as explained on the UP website):

- National Senior Certificate (NSC) or an equivalent qualification with admission to bachelor's degree study.
- An Admission Point Score (APS) of 30 (Grade 12 applicants calculate their APS using Grade 11 marks when applying, but Grade 12 marks are used for APS calculations for applicants who have already obtained a NSC or equivalent qualification. Applicants must achieve an APS of at least 28 in Grade 12 for final admission).
- English Home Language or English First Additional Language (Level 5).
- An art- or design-related school subject is not a requirement, but all applicants must complete and submit a digital ID selection form, comprising question sections and a portfolio section, as part of their application.

**NOTE** After submitting your UP application, please print the proof of your successful application, and then continue with Step 02, i.e. your application at ID.

# STEP 02

# Where can I get the ID selection form?

## **APPLY AT ID**

All applicants must complete the ID selection form, which consists of question sections and an online portfolio section. The form, which is available as a PDF document on the Visual Arts page on the UP website, must be submitted digitally by 30 June 2025. No late applications will be accepted.

Email your completed ID selection form to visualarts.selection@up.ac.za.

**NOTE** After submitting the required digital deliverables to ID by 30 June 2025, make sure to book a provisional appointment for an interview and selection test.

## **QUESTIONNAIRE**

The questionnaire section of the ID selection form requires you to answer questions about yourself, including education, personal interests and achievements, motivation for study, etc. Moreover, the form will facilitate the uploading of your portfolio pieces (as detailed in the portfolio section that follows) via a WeTransfer link (WeTransfer is a free online file-sharing resource).



## APPLY AT ID (CONTINUED)

#### **PORTFOLIO**

You are required to submit 12 portfolio pieces as part of Step 02 of the selection process. The selected pieces must be collated and uploaded to the ID selection form as one digital portfolio file (.pdf) no larger than 80mb, and uploaded to the ID selection form. Remember that a good portfolio shows a diversity or variety of media and content. The following requirements are guidelines for the selection of work:

- Only include examples of works that have been created in the last two years.
- Please present the photographs of your work in an A4-sized digital file format.

The portfolio must include:

#### 1 x ORIGINAL DRAWING FROM OBSERVATION

Use an A2 sheet of paper and graphite pencils to complete a drawing from observation (not from a photograph). Select a flat surface and set up a visually interesting still life comprising 5 - 8 objects that you have at home. Choose objects that are made of different materials (for example: fabric, glass, metal, organic material such as fruit or flowers/ leaves) and have a variety of textures, shapes and colour. Carefully arrange the selection of objects, keeping a single light source in mind. Spend some time trying different arrangements. Walk around your still life to consider different angles when selecting your composition. Before you begin your final drawing, draw quick thumbnail sketches of different angles to decide on what you believe is an interesting and dynamic visual composition. Once you have finalised the still life arrangement, draw your composition on an A2 paper. You must complete the drawing from observation in 2 hours and 30 minutes. It is essential that you time yourself. We know what a 2 hour and 30 minute drawing looks like, so keep to the specified time limit. It is compulsory for you to write the date, as well as the start time and end time of your drawing in the bottom right-hand corner of your A2 page. A prior assignment's still life will not meet this requirement.

Take a clear photograph of your still life that you've observed and a photograph of your final drawing, which you need to upload when completing the ID selection form; failure to submit the photograph of the still life arrangement together with your drawing of the still life will immediately disqualify your application.

#### 3 × ORIGINAL PHOTOGRAPHS

Submit 3 original photograph that show good pictorial direction when photographing: (1) a portrait of a person or group of people, (2) a building or architectural detail, and (3) a still life. Reflect a personal interest through the subject matter that you choose. Do not use filters for enhancement; in other words, we are looking for *raw*, *unprocessed photographs* that demonstrate your ability to capture emotion/character/narrative.

## PORTFOLIO (CONTINUED)

#### Portfolio Tip

Keep the photographs of your work simple. Avoid cluttering the photographs with add-ons or unnecessary extras that may detract us from seeing the work clearly. Refer to the examples alongside.


#### **8** × ADDITIONAL WORK

For the rest of the portfolio, please include a selection of eight photographs of your art/ design work to indicate your proficiency in auto-graphic hand-drawn mark-making, expression and communication. The work that you select should show your preference for Information Design; the portfolio pieces that you choose to submit can be 2D or 3D. The photographs need to be clear and of a good quality, but need not be taken by a professional photographer. You may include work from any of the following categories:

- illustration/drawing (in pencil, charcoal or pastel)
- paintings (in watercolour, gouache, acrylic or oils)
- print-making
- 3-D designs/constructions or sculpture (see tips below on photographing 3D work)
- technical or engineering drawings (a maximum of two)
- branding or advertising projects

#### **Labelling Tip**

Keep your labelling simple and clear. Avoid cluttering the labels with decorative fonts and extra elements.

#### LABELLING YOUR WORK

It is mandatory to provide the following information with the photographs of the six portfolio pieces you submit:

- A brief description or rationale (50 words) of the idea/concept of your work.
- The commissioner of the work, i.e.: was it done for school, a client, or was it self-commissioned?
- The size and medium (e.g. pencil, oils, pastels) of the work.
- The year in which the work was completed.

## Photographing 2D work

Remember to avoid glares (do not take photographs under direct light). Make sure you capture sharp photos, and avoid submitting images that are out of focus).

#### TIPS FOR PHOTOGRAPHING 2D WORK





**Glares and dark edges:** Make sure to capture your photographs in natural light in a well lit area. Photographs captured in darker areas with harsh lighting will result in dark edges and glares.





**Blurry images:** Make sure that you submit sharp images. Adjusting your shutter speed and using a tripod are good ways to avoid blurring your images.

## Photographing 3D work

Remember to focus on lighting and angle variation when photographing 3D work.

If you choose to submit
photographs of 3D work, you
may also decide to photograph
your work from different
angles. Please note that all
angles of the same work count
as only one portfolio piece.

#### TIPS FOR PHOTOGRAPHING 3D WORK



**Stage:** Build a white stage or drape a black backdrop against which to showcase the object.



**Angles:** Experiment with different angles to present dynamic photographs of 3D work.



**Lighting:** Experiment with light placement for dynamic and well-lit objects.



**Cropping:** Don't be afraid to crop your work to exclude unnecessary elements or surroundings.

# Selection interview & test appointment

Finalise a provisional date for your appointment no later than Monday, 30 June 2025.

You must book a provisional date for your selection interview and test appointment by 30 June 2025. Interviews and selection tests take place between 12 - 19 July 2025. Please phone (012) 420-2353 on weekdays (between 08:00 and 15:00) to make an appointment for **one** of these dates. Kindly note that if you do not finalise your interview and test date by Monday, 30 June 2025, you risk the chance of losing an opportunity to continue with the selection process even if you meet the requirements of the merit selection process.

If you do not receive an email from us by 11 July 2025, you can assume that you qualify for the final round of the selection process. This means that your booking is automatically confirmed for the selection interview and test.

Please report to the foyer of the Visual Arts building on main campus at 07:30 for 08:00 to register on the day of your appointment. The concept test begins at 08:00; you will have an hour and a half to complete the test. Subsequently, 20 minute interviews will be held with each candidate between 10:00 - 16:00. Should you wish to present original works in addition to the digital portfolio you submitted, you may do so during your interview. Please bring these works on the day of your interview and test and remove them on the same day as ID cannot accept responsibility for storing your work.

#### UNSUCCESSFUL APPLICATIONS

You will be notified by 11 July 2025 if your Information Design application does not meet the requirements of the merit selection process for ID. Your application status will be sent to you via email so please ensure that you provide your preferred email address on both the UP application and the ID selection form.

If your application is not successful, you will not be allowed to continue to the final round of the selection process. Please be aware that the selection panel's decision in this regard is final; no correspondence will be entered into by the selection panel members, nor other UP staff, including administrators.

# STEP 03

#### PROCEDURES FOR SELECTION INTERVIEW & TEST

#### Access to campus

Applicants must access the UP campus using the entrance on University Road (opposite the Loftus Metro Train Station).
Please bring proof of identification (ID or driver's licence) to gain entry on campus.

Directions to the exact rooms and instructions will be posted in the foyer of the Visual Arts building on the test days.

#### PROCEDURE FOR SELECTION INTERVIEW

You will be interviewed by a panel of people, consisting of Information Design lecturers, a postgraduate student, as well as a representative from the design industry. The panel will ask you a number of questions related to your knowledge of the Information Design course at UP, the design industry as well as current local and world events. You will also be asked interpretative questions to test your lateral thinking skills. As such, personal insight and motivation are highly regarded in the interview.

#### PROCEDURE FOR SELECTION TEST

You will undertake a concept test, which examines your ability to think laterally, visualise ideas, interpret visual images, and communicate ideas in written form. The test will be considered with your portfolio and your interview for the selection decision.

**NOTE** Please bring the following equipment with you: pen, graphite pencils, sharpener, eraser, ruler (30cm), scissors and a glue stick.

#### FINAL SELECTION RESULTS

You will receive an email from us by 29 August 2025, indicating that the final selection results are published on the UP Portal. If you have been accepted, kindly call the Visual Arts adminstrator on (012) 420-2353 or send an email to visualarts.selection@up.ac.za no later than 30 September 2025 to confirm whether you will be taking your place or not.

#### ACCEPTANCE OF ADMISSION AT UP

If you have been conditionally or unconditionally admitted, please access the 'Student Centre' via the UP Portal on the UP website to accept or decline the place that has been allocated to you.

If you are not going to take your place, it is common courtesy to indicate your decision, not only for the University, but also for prospective students who may be on the waiting list.
