ProPsalm (Project Psalms) Seminar

Background

The University of Pretoria maintains a strong exegetical tradition with, *inter alia*, emphasis on the Psalms. Gratitude for this has to be served on the late Willem Prinsloo, for his efforts to promote the study of the Psalms in South Africa.

During 2003 a project was initiated at UP to internationalise and contextualise the study of the Psalms by means of a seminar. In view of various international cooperation relationships between the University of Pretoria and other international theological institutions this project was seen as a means to contribute to the local and international theological debate. Another aim of the seminar is to develop the debate into discussions between Old Testament and various other disciplines of theology and religion. Furthermore, an important vision of the ProPsalm Seminar is to involve international Old Testament specialists in the project.

One of the intentions of the ProPsalm Seminar is not only to involve European and Western oriented theological paradigms, but also to include African voices and paradigms. The theological encounter between Africa and Europe (Western) on the Psalms is an attempt to create understanding amongst the different streams of theological ideologies. Africa needs this and Europe (Western theologies) could benefit from this.

The ProPent and ProPsalms Seminars grew in stature and number during the past few years. These projects of the Department of Old Testament Studies at UP became part of the national Old Testament Society of South Africa (OTSSA) as a project of the subgroup for poetic studies.

During the past few years, in cooperation with the ProPent (Project Pentateuch) Seminar, these seminars have taken place in the second part of August. Propsalm is a two-day seminar. Three meetings have already taken place, with a stronger international and local (national) presence every year. Students were also allowed to attend as silent participants. To build this enthusiasm it is imperative that presentations should be published internationally.

A seminar volume, *Psalms and Liturgy*, appeared in 2004 at T & T Clark (JSOT SS). A similar volume of the Propent Seminar appeared in 2005 at Litverlag (ATM series) with the title *A Critical Study of the Pentateuch. An Encounter between Europe and Africa*. In 2007 a following volume, entitled *Psalms and Mythology* (LHBOTS, 462 – formerly JSOT SS) appeared at T & T Clark. *Psalms and Hebrews: Studies in Reception* (LHBOTS, 527 – formerly JSOT SS at T & T Clark) appeared in 2010, while the next volume is in preparation, namely *Psalmody and Poetry in Old Testament Ethics*. More volumes are envisioned and planned for the project in the next few years.

Psalmody and Suffering (25 - 26 August 2011)

On the 25 and 26 August 2011 the 8th international ProPsalm Seminar will take place in the Faculty of Theology at the University of Pretoria. The theme of the meeting is **Psalmody and Suffering**. This programme will focus primarily on Psalms and psalmody texts of lament.

Twenty national and international scholars will participate in the programme (consult programme). This includes subject specialists from Germany, Austria, Belgium, the United Kingdom, Nigeria, Zimbabwe and South Africa.

Participants include scholars from Old Testament Studies, New Testament Studies, Systematic Theology, Practical Theology and Ancient Languages. Proff Sue Gillingham (Oxford, UK) and Eckart Otto (Münich, Germany) will deliver specialist lectures, while other international scholars such as Prof Simone Paganini (Innsbruck, Austria), Dr Dominik Markl (Univ of London, UK), Drr Raik Heckl and Jan Dietrich (Leipzig, Germany), and Dr Emmanuel Usue (Nigeria) will also contribute to the Seminar's international character.
